- 5. When do you most often find yourself thinking of prayer or praying?
- 6. Which elements of the Lord's Prayer in Matthew 6:9-13 resonate with you most?
- 7. Prayer in its simplest form is a confession of our need for God. How might Matthew 6:9-10 help recalibrate your motives?
- 8. How can you develop a heart that serves God and others with pure motives? (Consider James 4:1-3 and David's prayer in Psalm 51)
