REFLECTION QUESTIONS

- 1. Joshua states that the tribe of Ruben, Gad and the half-tribe of Manasseh have reached their Promised Land, their rest. Based on John's message, how does helping the other tribes impact them?
- 2. Reflect on Joshua 1:10-15. What is the importance of Joshua's command to the two and half tribes as it pertains to the solidarity of Israel?
- 3. Background on the two and half tribes of Israel can be found in Numbers 32. What was their rationale for selecting land outside of the Promised Land?
- 4. How might the decision of the two and half tribes to live outside of the Promised Land affect their brothers?
- 5. How does the role of the two and half tribes challenge your participation in the church? In your community group?

- 6. The community of Israel is unified around a shared identity and a common purpose. How do these two things affect relationships?
- 7. The Old Testament priests had the responsibility of guiding the people in their relationship with God. How does someone guide another in a relationship with God? To what extent would you consider this your role?
- 8. In Matthew 15:10-14, Jesus refers to the religious teachers of his day (Pharisees) as blind guides. What does this insult suggest about the necessary elements of a spiritual guide?
- 9. There is a corporate element to spirituality and following Jesus. Each person, though imperfect, contributes to and guides the other. How do we know what the goal of that journey should be?
- 10. Israel has a complex shared journey with God. How has your spiritual journey developed? Could you name two high points and two low points in your faith? How might these help others?
